Welcome Back!

Dear Butler Area School District Community,

I am excited for the return of our students and staff for the 2021-2022 school year. For some of our students, this will be the first time back to school in person since March of 2020! The past 18 months have impacted all of us and all of our students in different ways. We are focusing our efforts to address both our students' academic needs as well as their social and emotional needs by focusing on relationships.

Academically, we are asking our teachers to differentiate instruction and learning to meet the individual needs of the students in their classroom. This will be most pronounced in elementary classrooms where multiple levels of learning are occurring in every classroom. What is this and what could it look like?

According to Carol Ann Tomlison, differentiating instruction means that you observe and understand the differences and similarities among students and use this information to plan instruction. This means there may be times when not every student in the same classroom is engaged in the same activity to learn the same content.

Building positive relationships is an important ingredient in meeting the needs of all students. Research has shown that students who feel connected to school are much more likely to be successful in school. That is why we have developed a Framework for Accelerating Learning, which has a focus on building relationships across the school district. You can find more information about the Framework for Accelerating Learning on page 8.

As we implement our Framework for Accelerating Learning, we will also focus on positive behavior. Across the district, our schools are implementing Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS), however it looks a little bit different at each school. You may know this program as the 3Bs, the 4Bs, SOAR, BEAT, Be Tuff/ Stand Up, or STORM. Having had a long break in the routine of attending school is going to be a transition process for some of our students. We will all need to be patient, flexible and understanding as we use PBIS to help acclimate our students back to the classroom. Learn more about PBIS on pages 10-11.

We are welcoming some new people to our school district as well as initiating new programming and reopening Broad Street Elementary School. We are also proceeding with our school organization plan, which includes adding classrooms and instructional space to the Senior High School to increase capacity for the 9th grade.

We are taking this opportunity to conduct a renewal process focused on the Senior High School. I encourage anyone interested to participate. More information can be found on pages 12-13.

While I am excited to welcome our students and staff back to school, I'm also very aware that COVID mitigation recommendations and county COVID data can impact our school district at any time. A summary of our current health and safety plan is on page 5. The full plan is available on our website. Please be aware that this is our starting point and is subject to change based on federal and state mandates as well as our local COVID data and information that we receive.

I hope everyone is having a great summer and I hope you are looking forward to the upcoming year as much as I am. I look forward to working with all of you for the success of our students and community.

CONTACT TRACING: The district continues to contact trace when cases are identified and informs parents. As required, all contact tracing information is reported to the Pennsylvania Department of Health.



DIAGNOSTIC SCREENING: The district has health/temperature screening stations in all schools. If Butler County is at the "Moderate" Level or higher, the health/temperature screening stations will be activated.





APPROPRIATE ACCOMMODATIONS: The Butler Area School District strives to serve all students. The Director of Special Education is authorized to work with special education teachers, IEP Teams and parents to make needed accommodations for the welfare and inclusion of students.

COORDINATE STATE AND LOCAL HEALTH OFFICIALS: The district participates in Butler County's Joint Incident Command meetings when called or scheduled. In addition, the district participates in state webinars if they are scheduled.

Health & Safety Plan

The following information is an abbreviated version of the district's health and safety plan related to COVID-19. The full plan is available on our website (visit www.basdk12.org and click "COVID-19" in the blue bar at the top of our website).

Butler Area School District is committed to fully opening our schools for the 2021-2022 school year. Based on the current information the school district has, we intend to begin the school year with the following strategies in place.



MASKS: Masks are not required by the Butler Area School District. Any individual who wishes to wear a mask is welcome to wear one at school and school district functions. Masks are required on all public transportation, including school buses, per the current federal mandate.



SOCIAL DISTANCING: The district intends to operate a regular 5 day instructional schedule for the 2021-2022 school year. Should the cases of COVID-19 increase, the school district would return its "Enhanced Green" model, which includes social distancing wherever possible, limits student movement in grades K-6 and increases physical distance at lunch for all students K-12.

HANDWASHING AND RESPIRATORY ETIQUETTE: Presentations on handwashing and respiratory etiquette will be presented to all students. In addition, signage and reminders will be provided.

CLEANING: The district will continue its current cleaning strategy including disinfecting areas where an individual with a confirmed case was present. VACCINES FOR THE SCHOOL COMMUNITY: Butler Area School District is a partner with Butler County and Butler Health System. As such, information regarding health resources are disseminated to parents and guardians. A vaccination clinic is located within the school district boundaries. At parent/ guardian request, the school district provides logistical support for students to receive health services.



BASD Early College Pioneers

Butler Area School District is excited to offer our Senior High School students the opportunity to participate in the Early College Pioneers Program!

The Early College Pioneers Program is a partnership between Butler Community College and Butler Area School District. Participating students will have the opportunity to fulfill BASD credit requirements and also earn college credits.

Thanks to the generous support of The Claude Worthington Benedum Foundation, there is no financial cost to our students. This is truly a unique opportunity for students in their senior year of high school.

IHS Advisory Period

The Advisory Program is a component of the Butler Intermediate High School educational program. The Advisory Program promotes student adjustment and success in school, to develop a student's positive self-concept, establish positive relationships, and encourage student involvement. The program is designed to prepare students for future opportunities, as they become responsible members of society. The program hinges on all participants believing in the program and accepting the responsibilities of the program.





Food Service

Butler Area School District will be participating in the Seamless Summer Option (SSO) in the 2021-2022 school year. This program is available to schools and districts as part of the waivers issued by USDA on April 20, 2021.

All students who are enrolled at Butler Area School District are eligible to receive a nutritional breakfast and lunch each school day at no charge to your household. No further action is required. We do recommend that you still apply for free/reduced lunch status if you think your family may qualify. There are additional benefits for families with free or reduced status.



Pollinator Gardens

The Butler Area School District received a 2020 Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection Environmental Education grant to install pollinator gardens at the K-4 elementary school buildings in the district. In addition, staff worked with educators from the Audubon Society of Western Pennsylvania to modify curriculum for using these garden areas with students. Classroom assemblies were conducted in the buildings at the end of the 2020-2021 school year for students to become familiar with pollinators and their habitats. As a bonus, pollinator gardens were also installed at Broad Street Elementary and Center Avenue Community School thanks to the efforts of staff members at both buildings. As these gardens mature over the next several years, it is hoped that they will become a focal point for environmental education activities at Butler. When visiting these schools, please look for these garden areas and the informational signage that is available to learn about pollinators in our community and the impact they have on our lives.





























We're Hiring!


Our goal is to operate on a normal schedule every day. Unfortunately, like many businesses and

Framework for Accelerating Learning

While some students thrived during the last school year, many of our students experienced challenges. This year, we are implementing a framework for accelerating learning to meet the individual needs of our students and move them forward.

The principles of accelerating learning, drawn from brain science and research about learning, mean that we must reinvent school in ways that center relationships, give educators tools to deeply understand what children know and have experienced so they can build on it and draw connections to new learning, lead with social and emotional supports and skills, fully integrate with academic learning and enable children to see their strengths and what they do know – to feel competent and confident that they can learn.

Building Relationships: Significant learning does not occur without significant relationships. Relationships fuel learning.

Build Confidence: Students feel connected and gain confidence, context and relevance.

Set Goals: Students are working toward something meaningful.

Learn How to Learn: Students develop the tools needed to learn and retain new information.

Learn Content: Target unfinished learning.

- Pre-assess (formal or informal) to identify unfinished learning.
- Pre-teach these prerequisite skills using
- targeted learning to whole group, small group or individual.

• Proceed with regular course or grade level curriculum.

Practice Deliberately: As students learn content, they will continue to practice the material.

The belief that we're born with a fixed amount of intelligence and ability. People operating in the fixed mindset are prone to avoiding challenges and failures, thereby robbing themselves of a life rich in experience and learning.

Growth

As we work to accelerate learning this year, you will notice an emphasis on growth mindset. So, what exactly is growth mindset? Carol Dweck's definition of a fixed mindset vs. a growth mindset is on the graphic above.

Your child will be immersed in the growth mindset while at school. This means students will be asked to take educational risks while teachers reinforce the importance of approaching the process of learning with grit and determination as opposed to praising students for their mental quickness or natural intelligence.

We'd love for all parents to get involved by showing their children the value of growth and improvement at home. Here are a few things you can do.

• Encourage your child to take risks and tackle new challenges at school and at home.

• Praise your child not for their mental quickness or natural talent, but for the amount of effort he or she puts into the learning process. Emphasize perseverance and effort.


• Communicate with your child's teacher and encourage your child to do the same. We all have the same goal of helping your child succeed!



Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS)

All Butler Area School District schools will continue to implement Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS) this year. Both Center Township Elementary School and Center Avenue Community School have already been recognized for their work in PBIS.

The intent of PBIS is to encourage and reinforce positive behavior from students by creating schoolwide expectations. PBIS is part of the larger Multi-Tiered System of Supports (MTSS) that the district has been implementing. This system of supports includes both behavioral and academic components. What I Need (WIN) Time is an example of an academic support in the elementary schools.

Since every school is at a different step in the implementation process, each school has a PBIS Team that works to create an individualized framework for that particular building.

The PBIS guiding principles include:

- Every child can learn proper behavior.
- Stepping in early can prevent more serious behavior problems.
- Each child is different and schools need to provide many kinds of behavior support.
- How schools teach behavior should be based on research and science.
- Following a child's behavioral progress is important.
- Schools must gather and use data to make decisions about behavior problems.



As part of the Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS) program, students were rewarded for their positive behavior with a visit from Mr. Andrews and his lambs!

High School Renewal Process

In the fall of 2018, we began the school reorganization process with a series of eight focus groups to solicit community feedback. At the forums, stakeholders reviewed a variety of possible school organization scenarios. New possible scenarios were added that were brainstormed by community members. The goal was to gather feedback and information from as many of our stakeholders as possible. Ultimately the following school configuration was selected based on community feedback.

Elementary Schools – Grades K-5 Middle/Intermediate High School – Grades 6-8 High School – Grades 9-12

The physical changes we are making to our schools to facilitate our new school configuration are now underway. When completed, the ninth grade will move to the Senior High School. This move will create both opportunities and challenges.

This year we will engage in a renewal and redesign process of the education offered at Butler Area School District's high school level. Throughout this process, we will be discussing who our students are; we will be exploring the work world in which our students will live and work; we will be reflecting on the programs, supports and resources we already provide; we will be challenging ourselves to identify gaps and areas where we can improve; and we will be reimagining the future for our students.

All of this will culminate with the development and



adoption of our portrait of the Butler graduate. The portrait of the graduate will define the attributes and key skills that we believe every graduate should possess.

Our hope is that students, parents, community members, business partners, higher education representatives, municipal, county and regional leaders, educational experts, professional staff, administrators and school board members will all be part of this renewal process.

We hope you will consider being a part of the high school renewal process!
